Councilman Dzyak summarized discussion from Water & Sewer Committee from January 13, 2020. Councilman Dzyak elected as Chairperson of the Water & Sewer Committee.

Councilman Pilliod summarized discussion from Public Service Committee. Councilman Pilliod elected as Chairperson of the Public Service Committee. The committee recommends installation of two (2) additional streetlights on Munson and Airport and, Browning and Airport; submitting an application to Hometown Takeover.

Councilman Kreuz summarized discussion from Public Safety Committee. Councilwoman Kreuz elected Chairperson of the Public Safety Committee. The committee recommends no action at this time regarding shortcutting through 110 W. Airport Hwy due to difficulty of enforcement. Recommend the owner post signs and place barricade to block path. Also discussed, confusion over State Routes maintained by ODOT, municipalities are hearing conflicting directives.

2. TMACOG General Assembly

a. Administrator will report on General Assembly held on January 27

3. Tree Commission Update

- a. The group is actively working on 2020 activities
- b. Arbor Day, plantings, recruitment for more volunteers, and much more
- c. Received information from the Ohio Department of Agriculture of the Gypsy Moth spraying in 2019
 - i. In a post application survey of the 107 acres sprayed, egg cases observed were reduced from 413 per acre to 40 per acre showing an over 90% reduction.

4. Project Allura Update

- a. Daily social media posts continue
 - i. Post about subscribing to newsletter yielding 16 more subscribers within a few days
- b. Video on Administration Office will be next.

5. Swanton Shines Update

- a. 2020 Tree Lighting set for Friday November 27

 - i. Cost to replace was just shy of \$3,200

1. Election of a Chairperson for 2020

Motion to nominate Councilman Pilliod as chairperson of the Public Service Committee made by Councilwoman Kreuz, seconded by Councilman Rose.

- 2. Street Lights- Munson & Browning
 - Councilman Dzyak requested street light information on the intersections of Munson & Airport as well as Browning & Airport
 - b. Police Officers took photos of the intersection to give you an idea of the intersections at night
 - c. The cost to install two new street lights would be a one time charge of \$2, 524.57 plus the monthly lighting charge
 - Recommend moving towards LED which would cost about 0.50
 per kWh
 - d. kWh hour is more, but less kilowatts will be used. Standard streetlights are \$60-\$80 per month.
 - e. Committee will recommending installing streetlights as proposed
- 3. Hometown Takeover
 - a. HGTV is ready for its BIGGEST Renovation Project EVER- a takeover to makeover an ENTIRE town
 - b. HGTV website asks
 - 1. Does your town have a Population less than 40,000?
 - 2. Does your town have homes with great architecture longing to be revealed?
 - 3. Does your town have a main street that needs a facelift?

Election of a Chairperson for 2020

Motion made by Councilman Rochelle, seconded by Councilwoman Westhoven to nominate Councilwoman Kreuz as Chairperson of the Public Safety Committee.

- 2. Shortcutting
 - a. Mr. Rick Lederman, owner of 110 W. Airport (former PNC Building) requested a discussion on curbing shortcutting through the parking lot at 110 W. Airport
 - b. Mr. Lederman indicates that there are motorists cutting through the parking lot to avoid the traffic light at Main and Airport Highway
 - c. He is aware that both Wauseon and Delta have regulations on this topic
 - d. Mail Pouch Saloon has signs on their property indicating no cut through
 - e. Below is the section from the Village of Delta's Codified Ordinances

331.41 SHORTCUTTING; AVOIDING TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES.

(a) No person shall operate a vehicle across public or private property marked with signs "No Through Traffic" or words of similar import for the purpose of passing from one roadway to another.

- (b) No person shall operate a vehicle across public or private property for the purpose of avoiding compliance with a traffic control device.
- (c) It shall be prima-facie evidence of a violation of this section for the operator of a vehicle to cross public or private property as provided herein without using the service of such property, stopping the engine or both.
- (d) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.
- e. Recommend no action at this time as it would be difficult to enforce. Mrs. Hoelzle will speak to property owner and suggest putting up signage or barricades. Councilman Rochelle would also like Mrs. Hoelzle to contact ODOT regarding the light at Airport HWY and Main Street as to possibility of putting in a left turn signal. It was also discussed, as the property was previously a PNC bank, there is still an active ATM at that location, so it is difficult to manage additional traffic.

- 2. Economic Development Commission
 - a. Mayor Toeppe proposed an amendment to the Codified Ordinances
 - b. Discussion regarding the following topics ensued:
 - 1. What type of funding is required?
 - 2. Is the proposed Ordinance modeled after other communities? What has their successes been?
 - 3. If the Economic Development Commission would come to fruition, they have no authority, only recommendations.
 - 4. Council would like to have more control over who would be appointed
 - 5. Councilman Rochelle expressed concern for adding another layer to bureaucracy
 - 6. Discussion regarding an expert on Village Ordinances is needed to stimulate Economic Development and welcome new businesses. Administrator Hoelzle already fills this role
 - Mayor Toeppe stated most new business owners do not have the technical expertise to navigate new business requirements and understand Village Ordinances
 - 8. Administrator Hoelzle will work on development of a New Business Checklist.
