## Administrator Report:

## Water Service Line Survey

- a. As discussed previously there are many regulations coming into play related to lead and copper monitoring
- b. A difficult aspect of this monitoring, for many communities, is identifying where lead service lines may be located
- c. Mr. Yackee and I discussed a voluntary survey to post and have utility customers fill out
- d. There are pros and cons to this approach

## 2. General Updates

- Brush pick up began on April 5 and will continue weekly until May when it will go to monthly pick up
- b. May 8: Bulk Drop Off Day
- c. May 10: Hydrant flushing will begin
- d. May 21: Mandatory training on new AMI software
  - Office will be closed to public for a couple hours so Staff can train without interruptions
- e. Municipal Building is now listed as a distribution site for COVID-19 rapid tests

## 3. Project Updates

- a. Project 8 & 9
  - i. Advertise April 20 and 27
  - ii. Award contract at May 24 Council Meeting
  - Due to funding timeline, contract will not be signed until August
  - iv. Worked anticipated to begin in October and extend over the winter into Spring 2022
  - v. When contractor is laying pipe the road will be closed to through traffic
  - vi. Once road works begins, especially on W. Garfield, residents will not have access to their driveways to allow enough time for concrete to settle

- vii. There will need to be coordination on where residents can park, garbage pickup, mail delivery, etc.
- b. WRRF Master Plan
  - i. Work is about 65% complete on this review
  - Still on track to receive final reports late summer 2021
- c. Membrane Softening
  - i. Received a letter from OEPA regarding the proposed plan
  - ii. Mr. Shoaf will send in responses
- d. Memorial Park
  - i. Drainage
    - Poggemeyer will reach out to contractors set to perform other work in Village, as they will already be mobilized, and inquire on quotes
  - ii. Upper parking lot seal and stripe
    - 1. Asphalt work took place on April 21 and 22
    - 2. Seal coating should take place in late May or June, tentative
- e. Phase 2 Meter Update
  - i. Still set for installs beginning on May 11
  - ii. Residents received postcards; many calls into Office
    - 1. As of April 22, 156 appointments scheduled
  - Base station and repeaters, for the AMI system, installed the week of April 19
- f. Woodside
  - i. Results of geotechnical work came in
  - ii. Poggemeyer finalizing documents so it can go out to bid
- g. Beard Pavilion
  - i. Structure is coming along nicely
  - ii. Looking to find a better solution for birds and nests
  - iii. Will be painted to match Memorial Pavilion
- h. Safe Routes
  - i. No major update at this time; waiting on pre-con meeting
- i. Title XV Codified Ordinance Update
  - i. No major update at this time; waiting on report from interviews
- j. Sidewalk Replacement Grant Program
  - No major update- waiting for temperatures to level off before work will begin
- k. Facade Enhancement Program
  - i. Regroup meeting is scheduled for May 6, 2021 at 6:00 p.m.
  - ii. Applicants were all emailed details on said meeting

- a. Patrolman Lee Kusz provided notice to Chief Berg that he would submit a letter of resignation

  - a. Public Service crews began work tearing up concrete at the property the Village now owns on S. Main Street (across from VFW)
  - b. The intent is to clean up the property to seed for a nice grass area filled with picnic tables for the public's enjoyment
  - c. Discussion items
    - i. The area is used for parking by the public
    - ii. Survey of property
      - 1. Clearly shows the property lines
      - 2. The property the Village owns abuts the building to the North
      - Therefore, the make shift "road" on the north side of property/ south side of building is not a dedicated road but part of the property

4. Motorists use this to go around the building at 106-108 S. Main. There is curb cut near the sidewalk; unclear the reason since there is no dedicated "road"

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- 3. Sidewalks-Ashberry Farms
  - a. There are questions related to the sidewalks in Ashberry Farms
  - b. The current Codified Ordinance regulation on sidewalks in Subdivisions states
    - i. "§ 151.640 SIDEWALKS: Prior to the granting of final plat approval, the subdivider shall have installed or shall have furnished adequate bond, as provided in § 151.690 hereof, for the ultimate installation of the following.
      - 1. (A) Concrete sidewalks not less than four feet in width and having a minimum thickness of four inches shall be provided on both sides of the new streets within any residential subdivision and on the abutting side of any existing street contiguous to the subdivision. Where such new sidewalk meets an existing 42-inch wide sidewalk, the new sidewalk may be narrowed sufficiently to meet the existing sidewalk evenly. Handicapped accessible sidewalk ramps shall be required at intersecting street rights of way in accordance with ADA standards.
    - ii. All but one intersection in Ashberry Farms do not have sidewalk ramps
      - 1. Cannot find any variances to indicate this was approved
    - iii. Construction detail drawings note
      - 1. "Curb drop by contractor at time of construction. Curb ramp and walk by home builder"
    - iv. This was clearly not done

 For less than \$10,000 the Village can rectify the situation when the contractor comes in for Sidewalk Improvement Program work later this Spring
